


1. Both public and private policy makers have constituencies that may trump any research. (Jun. '08)






3. Research needs to make the impact of current trends real to us today. (Oct. '08)




4. The impact of personal income on policy trends shouldn't be overestimated; i.e. there is worse advice than "follow the money." (Feb. '08)



5. Government agencies sometimes act at odds with direction of elected officials. (Nov. '07)




